The circumstances of a feral burning accident which occurred at a house in Salvador Road, Wembly Park, av an early hour on June 16, as a result of which Ivy Bell (20), died in the Perth Hospital several hours later, were inquired into by the acting Coroner (Mr. M. H. Murray, J.P.), in the City Courthouse. Mr. Naira watched the proceedings on behalf of Thomas Clare, at whose home the accident orcurred.

Dr. J. Day, a resident nedical officer at the Perth Hospital, said that he conducted a post-mortem examination of the deceased on June 17. He found that she had been severely burned on the arms, thighs, face and back, Leath was due to shock, fellowing exiensive burns on the body.

Thomas Clare, a building contractor. stated that deceased was a friend of his wife. About five mouchs ago she came to stay at his home in Salvador Boad. Wembley Park. On the night of June 16 witness and his wife went out, leaving Miss Bell at home with their child. They returned about 11 p.m. Deceased was then in bed and the electric light was burning in her room. About 2 o'clock the following morning, witness and his wife were awakened by screams which were coming from the direction of Miss Bell's room. Witness rushed to investigate and saw that the bed in deceased's room was in flames. Deceased was standing in the centre of the room, and her night attire was in flames. Witness extingnished the flames on de reased and then hurried out to procure water to throw on the burning bed. When he returned, the injured woman had gove to the

on the floor. With his wife's assistance witness wrapped the deceased in a blanket, and then drove her to the hospital. When he asked deceased how the fire started, she replied that she was not certain, but she supposed that the wires attached to an extension reading lamp had fused. He found the charred portion of an extension light by deceased their the accident.

Lucy Clare, wife of the previous witness, said that the deceased used to place an extension reading light on a box by her besself.

Mr. Nairn read the following extracts from the letter: "I would strongly advise you to see a solicitor in connection with Ivy's death. Any per-

son who employs a servant must have the servant insured. The full amount payable is £750. Be sure and always say Ivy contributed towards the maintenance of your home. Write to the State Insurance Office at once."

Mr. Nairn: Was deceased ever employed by you?

Witness: No, she was staying with us as our guest.

The acting-Coroner returned a verdict of accidental death. No blame being attachable to anyone.
